Mandy led the Crusaders in goals, netting 35 of them in her







The students at SHDHS are blessed to have a mentor, teacher, and leader to walk with them and help guide them on their faith journey. Mrs. Annie Poat joined the Crusaders this past school year as the first full-time Campus Minister.

The role of campus minister is to provide faith support and encouragement to students through small groups, retreats, service, prayer services, and fun activities outside the classroom. Annie's goal is to meet students where they are on their faith journey and accompany them the way they best need to be supported. She says it is an honor to be able to be a witness and a guiding hand to so many wonderful people.

Annie's journey to becoming a Campus Minister began when she was a junior in high school trying to determine what she wanted to study in college. She said she had an amazing theology teacher who encouraged her in her faith journey and nudged her to consider studying theology. After many conversations, some awesome retreats, and a really powerful youth group, she decided that theology would be the right path. Annie attended Xavier University where she earned her Theology degree with minors in social work and peace and justice studies. At the time she wasn't sure exactly what she would do with her degree, but she knew she wanted to either do something in youth ministry or chaplaincy. While in college Annie volunteered for Bellarmine's youth group and quickly realized that she really enjoyed working with high school students. After school Annie worked in retreat ministry and then in youth ministry at a parish level and started fine tuning her youth ministry skills.

Annie says she didn't even know campus ministry was a path she could take until a few years ago. She always thought that youth ministry was only on the parish level, so she was thrilled to find out that she could work in a school and see students every day. One of the reasons Annie left youth ministry on the parish level was because she did not have enough "face time" with the students. So, when she heard about the campus ministry position at SHDHS, she jumped at the opportunity. Her favorite part of the job is being able to see students every day and talking with them when they stop into her office between classes or during flex (the time that used to be homeroom). She also enjoys going on retreats with the students because she gets to see them and know them in a different setting. She says watching them learn, play games, and let their guard down is a true privilege.

Joining the Crusader family wasn't the only big thing that happened in Annie's life last year. She and her husband,

Daniel '12, welcomed their first baby, Theodore, into the



world. Daniel also works in ministry. He works at the Jesuit Spiritual Center and he helps lead retreats.

Annie has some big goals in mind for the campus ministry office including recruiting students for campus ministry club, refining and creating quality retreat experiences for the students, and to build personal relationships with students. She wants campus ministry at SHDHS to feel like an inclusive, introspective, and joyful community. Her mission is for students to be able to come as they are, ask difficult questions, and grow in their spiritual lives during their four years of high school.

Annie says she is overjoyed to be working in a school where she gets to build relationships with students and help guide them in their own unique faith journey. Being a campus minister is truly a dream position for her and she says she feels so blessed that she was able to discover it at SHDHS.

For the concert at St. Timothy he was accompanied by Rachel Barnes, vocalist, Sara Reisinger, vocalist, Trevor Johnson, guitar, and Matt Spencer, flute.

Whittle says "It is such a wonderful gift to be able to make music with friends, provide prayerful music for those attending, and raise funds for such wonderful ministries!"


Perfect AP Pass Rate Streak Continues

Kids from second to eighth grade came together in June to learn from SHDHS students and then put their lessons to work with their performance of Annie KIDS.


Band Director's Final Curtain Call

Cru Baseball Players Walk The Mile

The Croyle family (Nick '15, Dominic '18, Vincent '21) runs a charity called Walk the Mile, Inc. which provides meals, new clothing, blankets, sleeping bags, and other basic necessities to the homeless.

In March the varsity baseball team pitched in and handed out meals, blankets, socks, and toiletries outside the Parish Kitchen. One of the highlights of the day was when a family of women and children passed by. The boys offered them what they had, but the family continued walking without speaking. Sensing the family might not know English, the boys didn't give up and rattled off some relevant Spanish words, including comida (meal), pollo (chicken), and ropa (clothes). The family stopped, turned, smiled, and happily returned to collect what the boys had.

Bill Croyle said, "That's how this morning went—these young men took charge and worked hard. They put together 100 meals in less than 10 minutes and embraced every moment outside in the sub-freezing weather to help everyone they could."

Crusader Part of Chamber's Youth Leadership Class

A Crusader is among those named to the Northern Kentucky Chamber of Commerce Regional Youth Leadership Class.

Makayla Hagedorn '25, was one of 50 high schoolers selected for the 2024 Regional Youth Leadership (RYL) class, representing nearly 40 schools in the Greater Cincinnati and Northern Kentucky area. This class marks the 30th year of the NKY Chamber's signature program.

During the eight-month program, students will collaborate with local business and civic leaders to learn more about various topics, including arts and culture, diversity and human services, economic development, health, law, leadership, and local government.

Students were selected through an extensive application process that included a minimum GPA of 3.0, a demonstration of leadership potential in their school and/or community, an interest in furthering their knowledge about the region and community leadership and approval from their high school principal or guidance counselor.

"This class, like before them, includes an impressive group of motivated and talented students. We're excited to assist them along their journey to ensure they are properly equipped to make important leadership decisions in their careers and within their communities," said Ann Marie Whelan, Program Director of Regional Youth Leadership.

SHDHS held its first Academic Scholarship Signing in May. In order to qualify for the event students had to either earn a scholarship worth 50% of tuition to the school they are attending, or were admitted to a selective school with an acceptance rate of below 50%. 34 members (30%) of the Class of 2023 met this criteria. In addition, they accepted \$1.9 million of scholarship money directly from colleges and universities.

All of its resources are designed to drive students to the United States Constitution and Founding documents as the foundation of their analysis of American history and current events.

Noah Francis '22 and Faith McNamara '23 took part in the prestigious M.O.O.N. program at St. Elizabeth Healthcare. Created by General Surgeon Dr. Ryan Moon, the five-day program introduces teens to the world of healthcare by



observing a physician's day-to-day life. Over 50 St. Elizabeth practitioners allow participants to shadow in practice offices. inpatient units, and the operating room. Noah and Faith were two of only 20 students selected from a highly competitive pool of applicants from five counties in the Tri-State.

Noah said the program was definitely an impactful experience where he learned so much about the process of becoming a physician and the wide variety of careers in medicine.

"Overall, the M.O.O.N program expanded my horizons with regard to medicine," said Noah. "It gave me the opportunity to shadow several medical professionals from a variety of specialities. From watching knee surgeries to interacting with patients at a clinic, I picked up on the real-life skills physicians have to demonstrate in order to become a successful doctor. I am also very grateful for the connections and friends the experience has brought me. The program definitely lit a spark of inspiration in me as I began this 11year process toward becoming a family medicine doctor."

Noah is currently a Biology major at Thomas More University. Faith will begin her journey to med school at Northern Kentucky University.

Alumni Spotlight: John Helmle, Bengals CFO

There is a saying "Good things come from unexpected places" and for one Crusader alum this could not be more true.

John Helmle '02 is the Chief Financial Officer of the Cincinnati Bengals, a dream job that he landed in 2022. But if you had asked the John that walked through the doors of SHDHS as a freshman if he thought that is where his career path would lead, he probably would have laughed at you.


John did not grow up in private school, so it was a bit of a shock when his dad, **John Helmle '77**, threw him a curveball and sent him to SHDHS. At first John was not happy, but he quickly made friends and connected with several teachers, including Mr. Gish, Mr. Faust, and Mr. Graue. He also found his calling... accounting.

John said when he went into high school, college wasn't on his radar, "but when I got to St. Henry, the discussion among my friends wasn't IF you were going to college, but WHERE you were going to college. It was a given that that would be our next step."

So he did. John enrolled at

Northern Kentucky University, but he and college didn't get along and he found himself working several jobs. He said that is when he started considering other options like going into the workforce or possibly entering the Air Force. Then his aunt, **Tina Helmle Ryan '86**, former SHDHS Religion teacher, stepped up and said, "no". She told John he was going to move in with her and her family and he was going to focus on and graduate from college. So, he did. John continued attending Northern Kentucky University where he earned his undergraduate degree and then received his MBA at Xavier University. When he graduated John set a goal for himself to be a CFO by the age of 40.

In 2015 John got a job offer in North Carolina, so he and his wife, Erica, moved. John said his wife deserves



functions of a company, not just the numbers. He had to learn how to fix problems and make the numbers work. John said this knowledge was invaluable because it would help him be a better CFO.

As a lifelong Bengals fan, John said he wasn't too upset about the delay. After the season ended the front office contacted him and offered him the job, which he, of course, accepted.

John, Erica, and Merrick moved back to NKY where they were happy to once again be with family, and where John would achieve the goal he set

for himself after college to be a CFO by the age of 40. Oh, and John's first task as the Bengals CFO was to navigate the deal that would give Paycor naming rights to the stadium. Talk about being thrown right into the new role!

Since inking the Paycor deal, John has had his hand in several other team developments including working with data to customize the Bengals fan experience.

John credits a lot of his success to SHDHS and the education he received. "I am forever indebted to SHDHS. The teachers there and the friends I made pushed me to be more than I ever imagined I could be, including inspiring me to attend college. SHDHS completely changed the trajectory of not only my career, but also my life."





Alum, Former Coach Inducted Into NKY Sports Hall of Fame

A Crusader alum is a two-time Hall of Famer.

Eric Neuhaus '97, who is a member of the SHDHS Hall of Fame Class of 2021, was inducted into the NKY Sports Hall of Fame in February.

During his time at St. Henry Eric ran both cross country and track and helped lead the school to two cross country state titles, one track state title, one cross country state runner up, and one third place finish at the state track meet.

After high school he took his running abilities to the collegiate level. He was named the 1997 cross country MVP at Marian College, now Marian University, in Indianapolis, before transferring to Wilmington College where he continued to bring in accolades. Eric was named a three time Academic All-American, was the fourth fastest of all-time on Wilmington's performance list, placed 17th at the 1998 Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference, was the 1998 HCAC runner of the week, finished 6th at the HCAC in 1999 to lead his team to a second place finish, named to the 1999 all-conference team for both track and cross country, and in 2000 had the best overall finish by any Wilmington College athlete.

After college Eric came back to St. Henry to teach math and coach the cross country and track distance teams. The accomplishments of the cross country team under his leadership are numerous, but some of the highlights include - setting a Kentucky State record with five consecutive state titles and five regional titles; being named Kentucky Team of the Year; recorded the fourth best score in Kentucky State Meet history; and three times being named Kentucky Class A Team of the Year. Eric was also two time Kentucky Coach of the Year, four time Kentucky Class A Coach of the Year, and three time Region Five Coach of the Year.

After leaving SHDHS, Eric went to the University of Cincinnati where he coached 11 Big East qualifiers and one regional qualifier. His teams have finished the runner-up in the all-Ohio cross-country and all-Ohio track and field championships.

The Northern Kentucky Sports Hall of Fame was formed October, 1982 for the purpose to recognize and honor individuals for outstanding athletic achievements and overall contributions to the sports scene in Northern Kentucky.

Crusader Inducted Into Xavier University Hall of Fame

A Crusader volleyball player who dominated the court while at SHDHS and then became one of the most



decorated players of all time at Xavier University is now a Hall of Famer.

Abbey Bessler Schuster '13 was inducted into the XU Hall of Fame in February.

She was a two-time (2013 and 2016) American Volleyball Coaches

Association (AVCA) All-America Honorable Mention selection and named a three-time AVCA All-Region First Team, two-time AVCA All-Region Honorable Mention selection and 2013 ACVA East Region Rookie of the Year. Abbey was also named one of 30 candidates for the Senior Class Award in October of 2016 for her character, her work in the classroom, on the court and in the community.

Bessler was named the 2015 BIG EAST Player of the Year after being ranked fifth in the conference in points, fourth in kills and ninth in digs. During the 2015 season, she was also ranked nationally in total attacks and attacks per set. She finished the season with 1,267 total attacks, ranked sixth on the Xavier single-season list, and 490.5 total points, which ranked eighth in single-season history.

She was a four-time BIG EAST First Team member, a four-time selection to the BIG EAST All-Academic Team and a three-time BIG EAST All-Tournament Team selection. During the 2016 BIG EAST Semifinal against Marquette, she recorded 12 kills, three aces and five digs.

Bessler is Xavier Volleyball's all-time leader in attack

attempts (5,094) and points (2010.0). She ranks second in kills (1,774), sixth in digs (1,392) and is a member of the 1,000-1,000 club for kills and digs. She also holds the school records for kills (33) and points (34.0) in a match.

Volleyball is definitely in Abbey's genes. Her mom, **Kathy Tepe Bessler '83** was on the St. Henry High School volleyball team that



won the state tournament in 1981. She attended Miami University on a full volleyball scholarship where she racked up numerous records and honors. She, and her twin sister **Wendy Tepe Tobergte '83,** were inducted into the Miami Hall of Fame in 1994. Both Kathy and Wendy were also inducted into the SHDHS Hall of Fame in 2020.

Alum's Unique Football Book More Reliable Than Stock Market

Did you know the Bengals are 9-0 against the spread in Week 16 in the year that the average price for large Grade A eggs is at least \$2 per dozen in any month?

That is just one NFL "fun fact" found in Vincent Croyle's '21 book "The Cowboys are 14-0 in Games When...: 101 Wild Stats to Pick NFL Games in 2022". The book is filled with crazy statistics you won't find anywhere and every stat is specific to the 2022-23 NFL season.

Vincent got the idea when he mentioned to his dad that he should have known the Steelers would beat the Browns. When his dad asked why he should know that, Vincent replied with "because the Steelers were 10-0 in their first game after a road game after a home win after the release of any movie featuring Spider-Man since Sony took over in 1999."

After that realization, Croyle spent hundreds of hours and several months researching stats pertaining to games in 2022. The Bengals stat at the beginning of the story held true when the Bengals beat the Patriots 22-18 in Week 16, so it's now 10-0.

Another example "Since 2005, the Seahawks are 16-1 against the spread in their game closest to December 4." The Seahawks beat the Rams, in Los Angeles, on December 4, 2022.

The book hit number 1 on Amazon among all new

releases in sports betting and then, in August, it was ranked number 14 among all football books, new and old, including three spots ahead of Tom Brady's book.

Croyle said he is very happy with how the book turned out and with how well the stats performed. He kept an in-depth record of how everything played out and here are the results: his stats won at a rate of 56.9% (57-43-1); the stats that picked the winner of the game won at a rate of 64.3% (27-15); if someone bet \$1 on every stat, they would have lost \$1.08 over the course of the entire season (which is very impressive by casual sports betting standards).

Another fun fact, his book outperformed the stock market! From September 8 to January 8 (the beginning and end of the NFL regular season), the S&P 500 lost 2.77%. During the same time frame Vincent's stats only lost 1.07%. So, mathematically, his stats were a better investment.

Croyle is in the process of writing a second book. He said it will probably look very similar to his first one, but will, hopefully, have a positive return. However, he says, even if the stats don't perform well, he has found that just following along and rooting for the stats made the NFL season much more enjoyable. According to Vincent, most fans only care about 6% of games (the ones their favorite team is playing in), but these stats give fans reason to care about how many points are scored in a random afternoon game without the need to bet money.


2004 State Championship team. He's been honored by SHDHS with a soccer award named after him.
